Pusat Ehsan Completes First Phase of New Classroom Construction

Remember the Panaga Bazaar that was held on Saturday, October 6, 2018? Outpost Brunei-Seria organized the event to raise funds for Pusat Ehsan Al-Ameerah Al-Hajjah Maryam – Kuala Belait branch – a non-governmental organization that provides education, rehabilitation and training programs for children and adults with special needs. The bazaar was a great success, and \$9,000 BND was collected to help Pusat Ehsan.

Pusat Ehsan had several options to spend the raised funds, from educational materials to a newly constructed classroom, depending on the total amount





raised. Although \$9,000 BND is not sufficient to build a completely new classroom, it is enough to make a good start. Several contractors were approached and Tiong Yon Fung Construction was selected to do the job. In the last 6 weeks a large part of the new classroom has been finished.

The KB branch of Pusat Ehsan is always happy to receive financial aid, and finishing the classroom is their highest priority. Outpost Brunei-Seria and the students of Pusat Ehsan would like to thank the Panaga community for their contribution at the bazaar. Without your generosity this would not have been such a success! Ramadan 2019 Begins

Ramadan begins in May this year, and non-Muslims in Brunei are obligated to respect this holy time by refraining from eating, drinking or smoking in public during daylight hours. (Children are exempt from this obligation.) Many restaurants will be closed during the day or will only serve takeaway. Also, shops may change their opening hours to accommodate Muslim employees and customers. The month lasts 29 to 30 days based on visual sightings of the crescent moon.

Ramadan is the ninth month of the Islamic calendar and is observed by Muslims worldwide as a month of fasting to commemorate the first revelation of the Quran to Mohamed. The common practice during Ramadan is fasting from sunrise to sunset. Muslims refrain from eating, drinking, smoking and engaging in sexual relations. This annual observance is one of the Five Pillars of Islam. Fasting is fard (obligatory) for adult Muslims except those are ill, travelling, elderly, pregnant, breastfeeding, diabetic or menstruating. Ramadan fasting is safe for healthy people, but those with medical conditions should seek medical advice.

Muslims are also instructed to refrain from sinful behavior that may negate the reward of fasting, such as false speech (insulting, backbiting, cursing, lying) and fighting except in self-defense. Spiritual rewards (thawab) for fasting are believed to be multiplied within the month of Ramadan. Muslims also increase their offering of salat (prayers), their recitation of the Quran, and their good deeds and charity.

The pre-sunrise meal before the fast is called suhur; the meal at sunset that breaks the fast is called iftar. Family and friends gather to enjoy these meals together and to strengthen community bonds. Restaurants often have special menus and deals to attract people breaking their fast, so it is a great time for Muslims and non-Muslims alike to enjoy some local specialties.

The celebration at the end of Ramadan is Hari Raya (also known as Eid al Fitr), a three-day public holiday. During this festival, Muslims and non-Muslims, Bruneians and tourists alike are invited to visit Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah in person. The royal family of Brunei opens the palace to visitors every year to celebrate Hari Raya. If you go, be prepared to wait in long lines!

What was your previous role at Outpost Iraq Dubai? What did you learn there?

The Outpost Team in Dubai has three desks right in the middle of the HR floor at the Shell office. Coming from a job as a civil servant for the Ministry of Justice in the Netherlands, I learned that the oil and gas industry moves fast!

The Dubai spouse and employee community was easy to reach and meet with. Outpost in Dubai also provided services for the spouse and employee community of those working in Iraq. This was a bit of a unique case as employees are only in Iraq during the working week or during their rotation and the spouses are spread out all over the world in their base countries. We never met these spouses in person but still did our best to keep them as informed about Iraq as possible.

As Editor I was in charge of all publications. This included our weekly publication to the employee and spouse community with classifieds, events within Outpost and throughout the city, and any important announcements from Shell Dubai. We also published a quarterly newsletter with a different theme for every edition. We featured in-depth articles about the United Arab Emirates, and interviews with the many Shell employees and spouses that had special talents and passions besides oil and gas.

What have you found different or surprising about Brunei?


Coming from the desert, it took me a while to get used to so much green everywhere! There are so many animals everywhere, even in my garden. Now instead of skyscrapers I see Hornbills from my window. It is also a relief to not have a layer of sand on all my outdoor furniture. I have seen more rain in the past months than in all my time in Dubai.

What is your favorite place to visit and why?

During our time in Brunei we plan to travel a lot in the region. I feel a close connection with Southeast Asia because it's where my family's expat history started. I love visiting museums and seeing old pictures of now-modern cities. I can only imagine what it was like to be an expat in those times, without Skype, Whatsapp or relatively short flights home. They were the real adventurers.

Having been an expat for so much of your life, what advice would you give new expats?

Having moved around a bit, I always try to remind myself that the beginning in a new posting is the hardest, but also the bit you luckily forget about. Moving is a stressful life event and one you unfortunately just have to ride out. Once you are in your new location, my advice would be to be open to anything and everything. Your activities and the people you meet in the beginning might not be the activities and the close friends you end up with but just start somewhere! Before you know it you'll feel settled in. And in the event that you don't feel settled in – Outpost is there to help!







Cambodia

A Visit to Cambodia

We flew to Phnom Penh from Kuala Lumpur by Air Asia. The visa for Cambodia is available on arrival; you just need to have two passport pictures and \$30 USD. We were then welcomed by a local guide and transferred to the hotel to check in. That afternoon we toured the Royal Palace where the current king lives. It is home to examples of Khmer architecture such as the throne hall, the silver pagoda and the old compound of the old painting of Ramayana story. (Here you need to cover your knees and shoulders.) It is a beautiful site, though we were boiling. We then continued to the National Museum to see Khmer artifacts and statues.

On Day 2 we set off with a traditional mode of transport called a "cyclo." It is a Khmer rickshaw that has been around since colonial times. We spent about an hour on this grassroots transportation going through the interior of the town, and we ended up at the Central Market. This was the most fun part of the trip for the kids - shopping time!

In the afternoon after lunch we continued our journey to a memorial place from the Khmer rouge time. It is the largest





killing field where the Khmer rouge soldiers took prisoners to kill. You can still see the bones and skulls coming out from the grounds after every rainy season.

On Day 3 we started early for a five-hour drive to Battambang. We headed north to Udong Hill where the capital of Cambodia was before Phnom Penh and to the Stupa of several of Khmer kings. Here we hiked up 620 stairs. Then we continued to the small riverside town of Kampong Chhnang, which is famous for its beautiful landscapes and local pottery in the midst of the rice fields. We learned how the community makes pottery the traditional way and observed how sugar is collected from the palm trees. We

stayed one night in Battambang and then continued towards the countryside to try authentic local products such as rice pepper, rice wine, sticky bamboo rice and dried banana. The highlight of the day was the Bamboo Train - the oldest means of transport. Then we headed off to Siem Reap, which took three hours. We visited the Silk Museum on the way.

On Day 5 we started very early at 5:30 a.m. to see a spectacular sunrise behind the famous temple, Angkor Wat. After eating breakfast we explored Angkor Wat, the world's largest religious temple and the most marvelous architecture ever. Then we pointed the tour to the archaeological park. We continued to the South Gate of Angkor Thom and Bayon Temple with the gigantic smiling faces and other ruins in the compound.

On Day 6 we started our day by visiting the exquisite temple of Banteay Srei, the citadel of women. This is the most intricate temple that earns its name.

On the way back we stopped at the jungle temple known as "Ta Prohm", which is overgrown by gigantic trees.

This city is the gateway to the famous temples but still offers more than just stone. We also went to see the famous acrobatic performances of talented Khmer youth, followed by the wood carving museum where all the workers are disabled but very talented. We then headed to Pub Street to see the nightlife lovers and street

food along with massage places. Our tour guide also arranged a very nice buffet dinner with a traditional show at the Koulen restaurant, which was the cherry on top of a long, wonderful day. We had a fantastic trip and covered every aspect of Cambodia, guided by a local who was fluent in English. We were dropped off at the airport the next day, sad to leave this beautiful place.




